



# [ :industrial comfort: ]

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## :Table Instructions:

Congratulations on the purchase of your Industrial Comfort table! I hope you enjoy using it as much as I enjoyed building it. Below are a few bits of background information to help you assemble and care for your table.

All tables are constructed from raw steel that has been welded, brushed, and either powder coated or lacquered clear. The table's coating is intended to protect the table from rust as well as normal day to day wear.

The water meter covers/plaques that serves as the table's insert are actual covers/plaques that you would find in the streets and/or sidewalks of the municipality your table represents. These covers are not reproductions! As a result, the condition of every cover/plaque will be different. I have left the covers unfinished to preserve their unique originality; some covers still have their original black coat while others are rusted. If the covers are rusted I coat with clear polyurethane to prevent further rusting to preserve their unique finish.

Please note that the water meter covers/plaques are very heavy and have sharp edges (between 10 and 20lbs depending on model). Care should be taken when lowering the cover into the table frame to prevent unnecessary scratching or personal injury.

Clean with warm soap and water and be sure to dry thoroughly.

Wipe spills up immediately

This table is recommended for indoor use.

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## :nantucket: [polpis table]

The Polpis Table comes in two pieces; the base table and the water meter cover insert. It is up to you as to how you wish to use the insert, however the following diagram is a suggestion for the best placement of the cover to best conceal the locknut of the cover:

1. Stand the table frame up-right and place the water meter cover gently into the table frame taking care to not scratch the table frame's edges. The water meter cover is heavy and has sharp edges so please use caution.
2. There is a small brass worm nut on each water meter cover. This worm nut should be positioned such that the lower portion of the nut is hiding behind one of the table's legs. This is not a requirement but I felt the table looked best when the nut was hidden behind one of the legs.
3. Using a 3/16" allen key, adjust the 3 adjustment screws until the top of the water meter cover is level with the table's upper frame edge.
4. Show it off!



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## :boston: [don't dump table]

The Don't Dump Table comes in two pieces; the base table and the "don't dump" plaque insert. The easiest way to assemble the table is as follows:

1. Flip table frame upside-down and lay on a soft surface like a carpet, rug, towel, etc.
2. Carefully thread the upside-down "don't dump plaque" through the table cross members. The plaque is very heavy and has sharp edges so please position the plaque carefully to avoid scratching the table frame. You will want the ends of the plaque to be sitting between the table cross members and the bottom edge of the table top's frame. The cross members are the bars between the legs that have the 4 adjustment screws threaded into them.
3. With the table still upside-down screw the 4 support screws down until they are just touching the edge of the upside-down plaque
4. Firmly hold the plaque down against the 4 adjustment bolts and flip the table right-side up. This is an awkward step but it's important you hold the cover tight against the screws to prevent it from sliding around and scratching the table frame.
5. Once the table is right-side up you can use the 4 adjustment screws to fine-tune the height of the plaque and eliminate any wobble.
6. Show it off!



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## :san francisco: [ggb table]

The GGB Table comes in three pieces; the base table, water meter cover insert, and glass top. Table assembly is as follows:

1. Place the water meter cover so that the edges of the underside of the cover fit into the notches of the table frame's support rails.
2. Place the glass on top of the table frame
3. Show it off!
